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Sports Round Up

Rugby

Thanks to the passion and commitment of Mr Aislabie, rugby is alive and well with both a Junior and Senior team competing in the region this season. Strongly supported by Mr Gemmell, Mr Lauder, Mr Aliifaalogo, Taine Wilson and Mr Darby, the teams have had a stellar season with exceptional results. Both are young teams but this has not stopped growing momentum and success as they have progressed through the season.

The Year 9 and 10 team finished 5th at the end of the regular season. On Saturday 3rd July they lost a close semi-final to Whangamata 41-39, just missing out on the chance to defend the Berry Cup. The Future XV team finished top of the table after the regular season, winning all 6 games. On Friday 2nd July they played their semi-final against a much bigger Te Kauwhata team. After a hard-fought first 20 minutes they established some dominance to run out as comfortable 51-5 winners. This Saturday 10th July they will play their final against Thames High School. The game is at Ngatea and kick off is at 10.15am. The team has been well supported this year and it would be great to see Te Aroha supporters on the side-line again this Saturday, cheering the boys on.





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Hockey

Our two 1st eleven teams are performing well in their respective competitions.

The girls are competing in the Thames Valley competition played in Ngatea and are unbeaten, playing Te Kauwhata, Hauraki Plains 2nds and Paeroa teams. We are a relatively young side, comprising of Year 10 and 11 players, and the improvement that they have made already so far is impressive, so expect exciting things to come in the next couple of years as the team grows with experience!

The boys are playing in Hamilton on Monday nights in the C Grade competition. The team is also unbeaten with 6 wins and 1 draw so far. Harrison Burge leads the competition goal-scoring leader board with 21 goals.

We have a range of players from Year 9 through to Year 13, and they have also shown immense growth since the start of the season. Some of the goals they have scored this year have resulted from some well-executed teamwork and skills.

We are yet to play the bottom four teams in the competition, so with a bit of luck on our side, we can continue our winning streak and have a successful result for the end of the season.





Academic Support

NCEA Checkpoints for Senior Students

We are continuing to run NCEA Checkpoints every five weeks for our senior students. This is a process of collecting information on all our senior students' assessment work, focusing on who is keeping up with the work and who has to catch up. We saw significant improvements in overall school results using this process through the last few years and we have advanced this in 2021. Our next checkpoint has just been completed in Week 10. Our Deans are working hard to meet with the families of all students who need to catch up. Working with you, they will provide support for students to get organised and manage the necessary workload to achieve learning success. Smart Days

As we work through the second block of Smart Days, we can celebrate the amazing variety of learning and engagement that occurs on a Thursday by our students and staff from both the Smart Day and Smart Path Programmes. Smart Day has also enabled 52 Gateway places to be operating positively in our community and we thank our local and regional employers for their incredible support in getting our young people to understand about the real world of work. Our in-school Smart Days have engaged students in a wide variety of future career starters from Agriculture to Flying to creative and innovative arts including the Showquest, the School Production, music, fashion and foods. We covered technical and ICT skills along with study and wellbeing programmes. We have also seen a growth in business alongside life skills of driver education, animal care, sustainability and many more. All topics covered fit within the scope of Vocational Pathways and have challenged our learners to step into a future-focused way of learning. The William Pike project for Year 9 and Year 10 has been a key feature in Smart Days. This rotation's group is about to complete its Waihou River Kayak trip and last rotation's group ventured out to the Pinnacles on their overnight trek. These activities form part of the five major outdoor challenges alongside each student's passion project and community service time.



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Nuts and Bolts for Term 3

Vaping and issues with Health

Reminder to all students and caregivers that it is illegal to sell or give a vaping product to someone under 18, and that it is prohibited to vape on school property or grounds 24/7.

The Smokefree Environments and Regulated Products (Vaping) Amendment Act 2020 (the Amendment Act) prohibits smoking and vaping in schools, kura kaupapa, kōhanga reo and early childhood education and care centres (including their grounds and buildings). This means they are smoke-free and vape-free at all times. School management and boards must take all reasonably practicable steps to ensure that no person smokes or vapes in any part of the premises, whether inside or outside, at any time of day. This applies to everyone who comes onto the grounds, as well as in the buildings – for example parents and caregivers, teachers and kaiako, contractors and workers, students, or the community using the grounds at the weekend.

In New Zealand vaping is only recommended as a way to quit smoking, and is not for young people. Vaping is not harmless. Vaping contains unregulated chemicals and flavours whose long-term effects are unknown. Breathing in anything can have side effects. Learn the side-effects of vaping, by visiting:

Vaping contains nicotine which can have some negative effects on brain development in adolescents. Nicotine is highly addictive which, although it helps to quit smoking as it replaces the nicotine with less of the toxins in cigarette smoke, it is not harmless if you don't smoke. Please support us to ensure that Te Aroha College is smoke-free and vape-free. This will be a priority for term 3.





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EOTC

Education Outside The Classroom is a critical part of our extended programmes of learning. The Board and Leadership team have worked hard through term 2 to ensure these programmes are well planned, safe and any student travelling from school has gained informed consent from their parents or guardians to be out of school. This means permission slips must be filled in and returned the day before any event. Students with late permission slips or no permission will not be allowed to go. Please support our staff by making sure you have discussed any planned trips with your student and signed and returned the permission slip timeously.

Bus Bay Safety

Again we ask our parents and guardians who pick up and drop off students to be considerate and keep clear of the bus bays on both sides of the road. We are very concerned that there will be an incident and have asked the Police to support us on random days next term to ensure we can uphold safety in this critical and 'high traffic' area, particularly in the afternoons.
