Reviews of Students' Learning

Learning continues as core business for students. Junior student/Caregiver conferences were held earlier this term with students leading discussion on their learning progress. Thanks to Caregivers who took up this opportunity and for the very positive comments on this method of providing learning feedback to you. Junior Student reports were sent out via email at the end of term.

A Senior Student progress checkpoint was done at the end of week five of term two. Caregivers will have received feedback related to the progress of your student, indicating whether all was going well/as expected or indicating where improvement was expected. Further checkpoint data was collected in week ten, and feedback to caregivers will occur early next term. One very useful aspect of our ongoing five weekly checkpoints for staff and Deans is an indication of how internal standards' credit totals are increasing for students.

Senior Student interviews for Caregivers were held in week ten. These were an opportunity to provide further feedback about learning progress and we hope you took the opportunity to meet your student's teachers and discuss your student's year to date.

Learning Centre Report



Uniform Expectations for Term 3

Thanks to most students (and caregivers for their support) who wear complete uniform in a tidy and respectful manner. Unfortunately, a minority of students choose to wear non-uniform items. This should not be, and does not need to be an ongoing issue for staff to deal with.

Towards the end of last term, students were reminded of some expectations as regards college uniform.

These included -

- The uniform includes black shoes with black socks, or black roman sandals. Sandals and socks are not to be worn. Scuffs are not acceptable
- College jackets, college blazers, or college pullovers are uniform items. Other sweatshirts or jackets are not acceptable.
- Students should not have facial piercings of any sort while wearing the uniform.

If students have incorrect uniform, they are offered and expected to wear, clean donated uniform items. It is ridiculous that some students prefer to be cold, rather than wear uniform items offered.

Regarding the wearing of correct uniform. Financial hardship should not prevent any student from wearing college uniform. Please contact the college's Senior leadership team if this is an issue as donated items are available for students, as is some financial assistance.
