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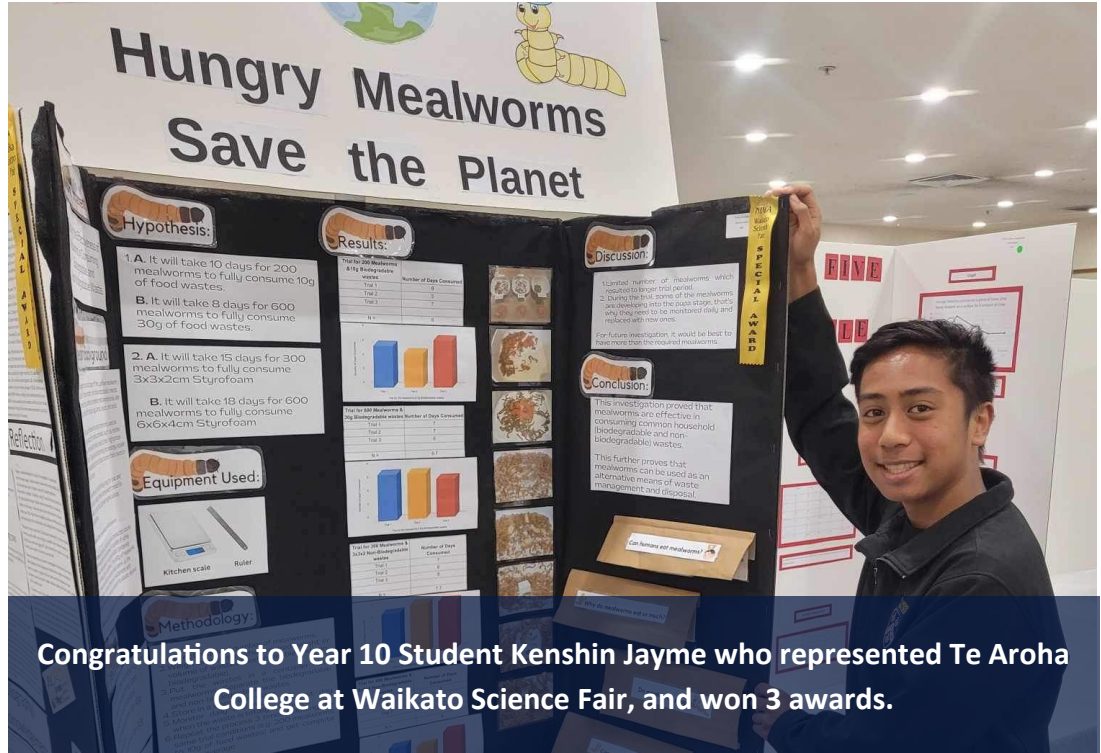

Sports uniform

In assembly this week we unveiled the new sports uniforms. This has been an initiative led by our

board of trustees student representative Jessica Bray with the full support of the board. Mrs Williams, Mrs Wade and Whaea Arleen worked with Ngāti Tumutumu in the design of our uniforms that reflect and acknowledge our local area. Many hours have been spent looking at designs, colours, styles, and the many options available now with sports uniforms. They definitely look distinctive and our students can proudly compete in a nice new modern uniform.



The whakamārama for this design starting at the top with the maunga, poutama and waka: to persevere to one's goals or overcome life's obstacles. The waka being a vessel used to travel. This could be to a venue or a new life stage.

The puhoro: Representing the Waihou, the pakati running through the puhoro symbolises a spine, in the same way that rivers were the "backbone" for the iwi providing a means of transport and kai.

The manaia koiri kōwhaiwhai: Representing people flourishing in unison, the retoreto within the manaia representing whānau.

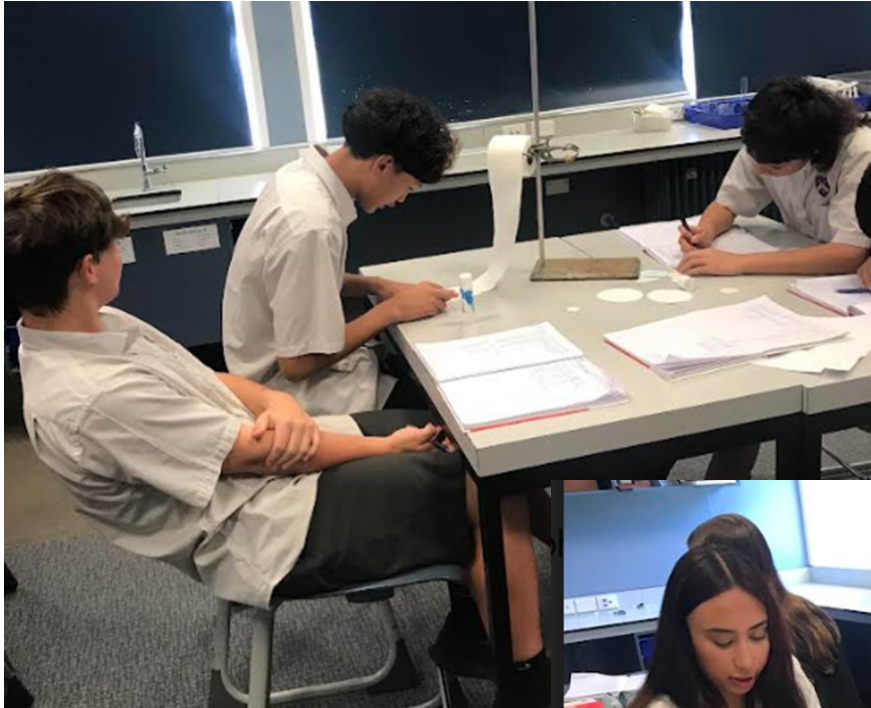

Matamata Piako Inaugural Model United Nations

Last Saturday, the first ever Matamata-Piako Model United Nations was held. This is an exciting first ever event to get students to think globally in Matamata-Piako. A United Nations is a conference where secondary school students are randomly allocated a country, at this event we had 30 countries, from the USA to Kiribati. Students attended from all schools from in the Region, such as Matamata College, Te Aroha College, Morrisville College and even students from Tauranga and Hamilton attended. These students are to represent delegates from their allocated country, meaning they have to learn how to represent that country. They have to learn it's politics, its demography and much more. And then finally, they have to debate a issue from that countries perspective. This allows students to be exposed to some cultures and countries that they may have not ever researched before. The issues that were discussed at MPMUN



were the United Nations Security Council on The Question of foreign intervention of in Humanitarian Crises and The question of Equity in Education. The organising committee felt like these topics were important to cover, particularly with the guest speaker coming in the afternoon speaking about women's rights in Afghanistan.

All delegates spoke and debated excellently, offering convincing debates and speeches on why other countries should vote for their amendment on the question. They all did so well in debating and taking part in this event. The atmosphere of students discovering their joy for an event like this was exceptional, many first time MUN attendees have come away really enjoying it, looking for more to expand on this new passion of theirs.

At the end of the day, Olivia Yates from Amnesty International was the guest speaker.



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Talking about the current Amnesty Freedom Challenge, supporting women's rights in Afghanistan. Mayor Adrienne Wilcock came in during the afternoon as well and spoke about Civics and looking at the world with a long-term plan.

Model United Nations events such as this one are usually quite inaccessible for students in rural communities such as the Matamata-Piako, as most events are held in Auckland or Wellington. The goal of this event was to get students to start thinking globally and to expose them to a new experience that they may have never been to. Many from the event are already looking forward to another experience, looking to the next Bay of Plenty MUN and events happening in Auckland early next year. The whole event was organised by a committee of 4 Year 13 students across Te Aroha College and Matamata College. The Coordinator was Luca Gem-

mell-Taylor, Promotions and Communications Manager was Sanya Bun, Finance Manager was Heather Hills and Educations Manager was Samantha Goodwin. This team has spent the last 3 months organising this event to happen, representing the National charity of UNYOUTHNZ. Also Mayor Wilcock helped with sponsoring the event and making it happen.

Adrienne commented, "It was my pleasure to support the small group of local student leaders in organizing this event, a first for our district. Having the opportunity to think globally, it was no surprise to learn that while there is some interest in politics, many attendees were keen to undertake courses at university that would lead them into the humanitarian sector."
