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#### Drug dog detection screening

On Monday 13 November we had our first drug detection screening at Te Aroha College. The aim of this exercise is twofold. The first is to make sure we take all possible measures to ensure a safe physical and emotional environment for our students by checking that our school grounds and property are drug free. The second reason is to act as a future deterrent for those students who are involved in drug use.

The drug screening process is used to support the drug education programme that is part of the health curriculum. The bottom line is that drug use, particularly during adolescent/teenage years can have a significant impact on a child's health and wellbeing with potentially life-long implications. I want every student to be in a healthy state of mind to learn and grow, physically and emotionally without the drugs interfering in these formative years. I have seen far too many students' dreams and aspirations ruined by drug use.

The results of the drug screening were very informative. We had three indications, two in classrooms and one in one of the toilet cubicles. This meant that the detection team were able to identify three areas of the school where drugs had possible contact or use. One of these indications resulted in further action taken in accordance with our policy. The other two indications have helped us identify key areas of the school to monitor more closely. The detection team went to 7 classrooms, all of the toilets, gym changing rooms, library, staffroom and staff toilets, administration block and outside areas around the school.

We will continue this process in 2024.

#### Uniform changes and expectations

Firstly, thank you to the many, many parents that support the school by ensuring that your child (ren) comes to school in the correct uniform. We really appreciate your efforts and realise that doing this has a financial impact and also there might be some difficult conversations with those teenages looking to push the boundaries or be a bit lazy. Oh the joys of parenting teenagers! We also understand that for some, getting the right uniform and then replacing items may not be possible due to financial constraints.

Next year will see a significant focus on our students wearing the school uniform correctly. We are a uniform school. When students and parents enrol at Te Aroha College there is an agreement that students will wear the uniform correctly at all times.



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At our last board of trustees meeting for the year, the board agreed to two changes to the uniform to make the uniform more enjoyable to wear, easier for families and more cost effective. These changes have come as a result of some student feedback.

The first change is that students will be able to wear **plain** black pants. These are to be semiformal in style. No cargo pants with pockets on the sides, black jeans or tracksuit pants. Grey pants are still part of the uniform.

The second change is to allow Birkenstock style leather sandals alongside the current Roman Sandals. The sandals are to be two strap and black in colour. There are much more affordable options from the Warehouse and Kmart.

- Absolutely no crocs-style shoes or foam sandals; and
- No socks and sandals to be worn in combination. If students have cold feet, please wear plain black shoes with socks.

At the start of next year there will be further information regarding these expectations and the processes to develop a school culture where it is the norm to wear the uniform properly. We will use incentive and consequence based approaches to support this school priority. There will also be opportunities for the school to help support students and families that find it hard to purchase some uniform items. We want all of our students to have the opportunity to look their best and be proud of themselves.



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#### End of year activities

As we raced towards the end of the year we tried to find some fun activities for our Year 9 and 10 students to do after their end of year examinations. On Wednesday 29 we had a sports morning and then a water based obstacle course which was good fun and the staff definitely got involved.
